

As many of you have noticed, our school has undergone significant renovations throughout 2024, breathing new life into our College environment. As part of the Victorian Government's \$14 billion investment in expanding kindergarten programs, the Murtoa College ELCC will benefit not only our current students and families but also future generations, offering high-quality long day care, integrated Three and Four-Year-Old Kindergarten programs, and, in the future, Pre-Prep programs. Run by Early Learning Victoria, the Murtoa College ELCC will ensure that our youngest learners receive the highest standard of early childhood education, providing them with a strong foundation for lifelong learning.

Our 2024 investment in physical spaces aligns with our belief in nurturing every aspect of student development—academically, socially, and emotionally. This year, we placed students in specialized learning precincts and implemented new additions to our secondary timetable, each aimed at enhancing students' sense of belonging and supporting the practical application of our new College Values: Community, Inclusion, Respect, and Integrity. To further support these initiatives, we established dedicated time each morning for students to gather in Student Connect homerooms, as well as weekly sessions to engage in College-wide wellbeing, inclusion, and engagement programs, such as Respectful Relationships and School Wide Positive Behaviour in Schools. These efforts reflect our determination to foster an environment where curiosity is sparked, ideas are nurtured, and students feel empowered and safe to take ownership of their learning in a socially and emotionally responsible manner.

Student Voice: Empowering Murtoa College

At Murtoa College, student voices weren't just heard—they actively shaped the school community in meaningful ways. Over the past year, Murtoa strengthened its commitment to fostering leadership, inclusivity, and active student involvement, bringing about initiatives that directly reflected what students cared about most. From leadership roles to collaborative projects, Murtoa's students made a difference.

Building a Culture of Leadership

The journey of student leadership began early in the year, with a rigorous application process that set the tone for an impactful year. Selected student leaders worked hard to represent their peers and bring forward ideas reflecting the school's core values of community, respect, inclusion, and integrity. Secondary Student Voice Captain Mikaela Wright and other student leaders

showed impressive dedication in shaping the school environment with initiatives that resonated with their classmates.

Engagement in School Culture and Values

This year, Murtoa launched School Wide Positive Behaviour Support. Part of this program is recognizing behaviours aligned with the schools core values. As part of this initiative, students participated in a school-wide survey to help decide how these values should be celebrated. Peer Support sessions and additional feedback opportunities allowed students to share ideas on which behaviours best embodied the values and how they should be rewarded.

The school also organized RecLink to run lunchtime activities, including weekly "Monday Funday" sessions and an ongoing basketball competition on Thursday lunchtime. These events provided students with diverse ways to connect, develop skills, and enjoy their school experience.

Casual Clothes Days with a Purpose

Casual Clothes Days became more than just a day to relax in jeans or pyjamas, show off team colours, or wear favourite costumes. They became a way for the school community to give back. Throughout the year, students donated gold coins on these days to support the SES, showing gratitude for volunteers who respond to local emergencies. In June, students contributed to the Big Freeze fundraiser, supporting motor neurone disease research. Recently, donations were collected to support The Smith Family, helping young people living with disadvantage. Each Casual Clothes Day not only raised funds but also strengthened the community's sense of purpose and unity.

Student-Driven School Improvements

Through Student Voice surveys, students proposed various school improvements and activities. Based on their input, we worked on enhancing its outdoor facilities, exploring options for new basketball nets, and even considering a beach volleyball court. With the support of Active Schools, Mikaela Wright, our Student Voice Captain, and a group of students prepared a proposal to present to school leadership. This led to a grant application, with hopes of making these ideas a reality.

With monthly Student Voice meetings, every student had a platform to share ideas and feedback. Suggestions not only led to changes, such as the introduction of lunchtime sports tournaments, but also provided a student voice on whole-school decisions like camps, assemblies, and activities that allowed both primary and secondary year levels to spend time together. Students numbers attending these meetings has slowly increased and so to has the and the flow of ideas.

Looking Forward

Murtoa College remains committed to maintaining this momentum of student empowerment. From new lunchtime activities to expanded community service initiatives, Murtoa students are leading the way in making their school a more inclusive, engaged, and dynamic place to learn. The message is clear – student voice matters.

A big thank you to all the staff and students that attended to make this Camp an awesome adventure.





































Primary Ag Initiatives: Our primary students have been actively involved in sustainable practices this year, thanks to the generous \$600 Woolworths Junior Landcare Grant for our "Worms at Work" project. With new worm farms and compost bins, students learned hands-on about waste reduction and soil health, enriching our vegetable garden with "worm juice" and compost. Upper Primary students also experimented with germination and observed radicle growth in bean seeds, while our mushroom-growing project led to exciting taste-testing sessions. We also welcomed 18 fluffy chicks, offering practical lessons in animal care and responsibility. Our students are also diving into sheep and wool studies, thanks to a donation from Horsham Wool, and have even crafted "pom-pom" sheep as part of their creative exploration.

Secondary Ag Education and Competitions: Year 11 students engaged in rigorous studies, from soil analysis after a visit to the Maher family's farm to learning about plant production and reproduction through hands-on dissection and crop management. We also participated in the AgXtra Crop Competition, allowing students to select wheat varieties and observe growth outcomes in a real paddock. With new moisture sensors donated by Hydrosight, students gained insights into precision agriculture, using data to monitor soil moisture in the polyhouse and wicking beds.

Industry Connections and Learning Beyond the Classroom: Murtoa College students visited AgXtra trial plots to learn from industry experts, including representatives from Nutrien and Australian Grain Technologies, and engaged with hands-on trial spraying equipment. Additionally, our VCE students explored post-harvest processing at local businesses like Johnson's and Blue Lake Milling, discovering the journey of grain from field to market.

Agriculture Teachers Conference in Wagga Wagga: Attending an Agriculture Teachers Conference, our team gathered resources and insights into the latest in digital agriculture and farming innovations. Highlights included a workshop on autonomous tractors and a tour of a local strawberry farm, offering a glimpse into advanced practices that we are excited to bring back to Murtoa College.

This year has been filled with growth, learning, and collaboration in agriculture, reinforcing Murtoa College's commitment to delivering a hands-on, impactful education.





















































